

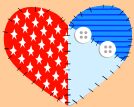

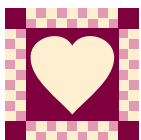

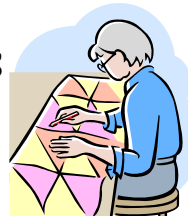

Minutes of the Lincoln Quilters Guild – May 8, 2006

The May meeting of the Lincoln Quilters Guild was called to order at 7:00 PM by President Linda Loker.

Vice President Linda Gapp introduced the evening's speaker, Bonnie Kucera. Bonnie, who is a member of Lincoln Quilters Guild, gave a very entertaining presentation "What Was I Thinking?" and included a trunk show of many of her creations.

The business meeting followed.

Minutes of the April Guild meeting were approved as printed in the Plain Print.

The Treasurer's report was also in the Plain Print. No questions were raised; the report was accepted as printed.

Announcements – Kate Laucomer. Refreshment committee for this evening was Sandy Gruntorad, Chair, Mary Dittenber, Sally Gowin, Bev Hillman, Barbara Kitsmiller, Rebecka Schafer, Betty Tenhulzen and Gwen Frans.

- Thank you notes were read from the Beaty family for the cuddle quilt their son received when admitted to St. Elizabeth Hospital and Nao Nomura for the Guild scholarship awarded her.
- The International Quilt Study Center is pleased to announce new Saturday hours this summer. The IQSC will be open for drop-in visitors from 10:00 AM – 2 PM on Saturdays from June 5th – September 1st. Drop by and catch up on the exciting events happening at the IQSC! Parking will be a breeze! Also groundbreaking for the new study center will be Friday, May 12th at 3:00 PM at 33rd and Holdrege.
- Sew/Quilt/Embroidery Festival will be held at the Quest Center in Omaha on June 15, 16, and 17th. More information and discount coupons are at the information table.
- Membership renewals are due June 1. If membership dues are not paid by July 1, you will not be included in the yearbook or receive the September newsletter.
- A note from Sandi McMillan and

Vogie's staff: "We are planning a 'pop-in' Friday, May 26th and Saturday, May 27th during shop hours. I know this is a holiday weekend but it was the only time we could come up with that could possibly work as a surprise for her. June is not leaving the industry but Vogies, the retail shop will be closing. We thought it would be fun to 'pop-in' during this time to wish her luck and thank her for the past 32 years. If you are not able to join us during this time, a card or e-mail would be great."

- Chris Taylor has been awarded a blue ribbon for best use of color at the Denver Quilt Show.

New Business

No new business was presented.

Old Business

A. Auction Proceeds – It has been determined that 10% of the quilt show auction profits (after expenses) be donated to Habitat for Humanity.

While the Guild's Executive Board can authorize expenditures of \$500 or less, if the auction profits are over \$5000, that expenditure would require approval of the Guild membership. Sheila Green moved, Lou Lessman seconded that regardless of the amount, 10% of the quilt show auction profits be donated to Habitat for Humanity. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Cuddle Quilts – Anita Ahrens reminded members that the need for cuddle quilts does not stop because of summer. Workshops will continue during summer months, if anyone makes quilts at home, the quilts can be dropped off at the Resource Center or contact Anita for pick-up. Three hundred sixty nine quilts were distributed this past year! A "thank you" letter was received from a Habitat for Humanity family who received a quilt.

C. President Linda Loker presented information about the new State Fair award that will be sponsored by Lincoln Quilters Guild. It will be for "Best Contemporary Quilt" – such as a new interpretation of a traditional design, or using contemporary or

nontraditional fabrics for a particular design, a new technique or approach. The piece can be, but does not have to be an original design, may be any size and chosen from any Lot 20 entry.

"Such as" gives people an idea of what sort of thing we mean, but leaves options wide open.

"New technique" is purposely left open for what may be new and innovative in the future. Stack and whack, stained glass, even paper piecing have all been new techniques in our recent past. It is hard to know what may be the new idea of the future – it could be on someone's design wall or in their sketchbook or just a vague idea in their head at this time.

"Embellishments" or anything else specific would not be included in the description. They could be a component of a contemporary design but if the description is too specific, it will narrow down the possibilities for new innovations.

Quilt Show Reports

- Sheila Green advises that there are still opportunities available to sign up and volunteer time to work at the show. Volunteers are encouraged to wear hats and their nametags while doing their activity. Members are also encouraged to patronize the food vendor while visiting or working at the show. A special feature of this show will be a display of Hoffman quilts. Thirty-nine quilts were turned in this evening for display at Quiltfest 2006.
- Shirley Chaffin, Quilt mom, reports that there has been tremendous support of ticket sales but there are a substantial number of tickets still with members. If members have tickets that will not be sold, Shirley would appreciate them being turned in so they are available for sale at the show.
- Jo Anne Bair reports that the opening reception Garden party will be held Thursday evening, June 8th for members and a guest. Garden party committee members have been surveying members this

- Vicky Skuodas reports that 85-90 quilts have been donated for the auction. Quilts may still be donated from now through the opening reception.

- Yes, you can use yardage from your stash – but be kind!
- We need Darks and Lights as well as Mediums
- Trim selvages off
- Cut 5 inch squares
- Stack fabric squares in twos – alter each pair at a 45 degree angle so it's easy to grab just two at a time.
- Place all trades in large "zip-lock type" bag labeled with your name.
- BRING TO MEETING – Pick up your swap (27 pairs) at the following meeting!

Doll Quilt Exhibition Opens October 6 at Great Plains Art Museum

Lincoln, Nebraska, August 3, 2006:

The quilt exhibition *Reading, Writing and a Rhythmic Stitch: Quilts from the Mary Ghormley Collection* will be on view at the Great Plains Art Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska from October 6, 2006 through March 18, 2007. More than 40 examples of nineteenth and early twentieth century doll quilts will be displayed with antique doll cribs and cradles.

Children were thought of as miniature adults before the late 1600s. As views of childhood changed, children's books, toys and games became popular. Doll quilts started to appear in the early years of the 1800s,

Doll quilts are some of the most endearing of quilts. Made by mothers for a young daughter's playtime, they embody love and care. Young girls made them as they learned to sew. As collector Mary Ghormley observes, "Perhaps the dearest of these quilts are those on which we see the childish imprint, youthful concentration in every stitch."

Mary Ghormley's Doll Quilt Collection contains more than 200 quilts made between 1800 and 1950. Collected over a forty-year period from all over the United States, it is one of only a few such quilt collections in the world. Mrs. Ghormley will share her knowledge in a lecture on October 18, 2006 at 3:30 P.M. at the museum. This lecture is part of the Paul A. Olson Seminars in Great Plains Studies series. The lecture will be followed by a reception and gallery talk.

The Great Plains Art Museum is located at 1155 Q Street in Lincoln. Hours are Monday-Friday, 10-5, Sunday 1:30-5, closed Mondays.

The Astrology of Quilters

Snail Trails, Broken Dishes and a Streak of Lightning: Evidence of Quilt Study at the IQSC

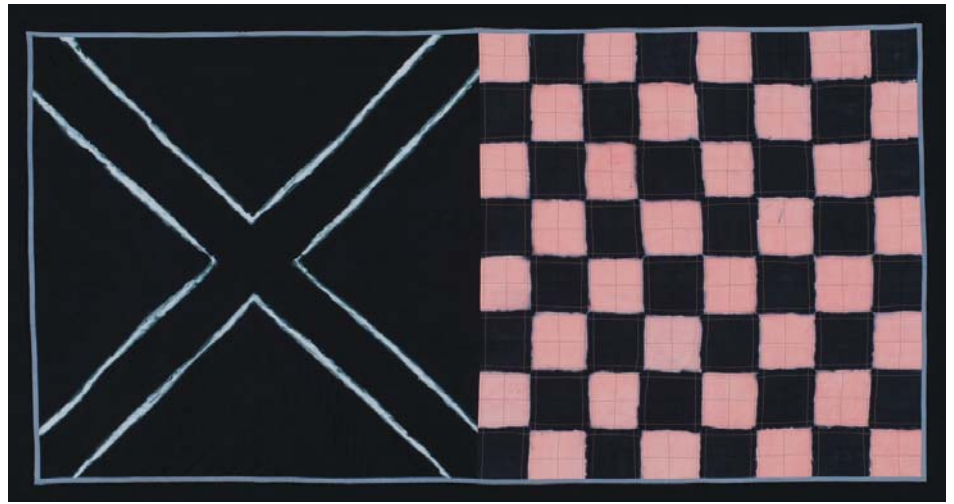
Lincoln, Nebraska, August 3, 2006:

Artist and educator Mary Anne Jordan immersed herself in the collection at the International Quilt Study Center during her appointment as one of the 2005-2006 IQSC Visiting Scholars. The results of her observations and inspiration will be featured in a new exhibition at the Robert Hillestad Textiles Gallery at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The exhibition includes new work from Jordan along with selections of the International Quilt Study Center quilts examined during her research.

In *Snail Trails, Broken Dishes and a Streak of Lightning: Evidence of Quilt Study at the IQSC* Mary Anne Jordan's new works respond to selected African American and Amish quilts to generate bold new designs on fabric. Jordan describes her latest pieces, saying, "I use large scale bold shapes and colors to add my own vision and hand to the work that has inspired me. The work is made of fabrics that I have dyed, printed, and painted. A human mark is obvious... I draw by hand and measure by eye...and allow the process of fabric dyeing and mark making to be obvious in the work. I am very interested in making "beautiful" quilts from fabrics that might be considered ruined: a kind of positive reaction to our cynical and impersonal world, a secret appreciation of life; a way of finding beauty in the muck."

Jordan goes on to describe some of her thoughts during the development of this series: "I was initially intrigued by the bold visual elements and color of these two broad groupings of American quilts. There is a kind of *complex simplicity* that attracted me to further investigate how the makers made their design decisions, compositions and the process by which they completed their quilts."

"I am also very intrigued by the fact that these two disparate genres (African American and Amish) seem to

have so much in common visually. Are the visual commonalities a result of similarities in culture? How does the process of making effect the visual outcome? What happens as a result of the process and what happens as a result of conscious decision making? What part does socioeconomics play in the finished quilts? Did they make the quilts primarily to keep their families warm? Were they concerned about the appearance of the finished quilt? What was the significance of a finished quilt (personal, religious, practical etc.)?"

"These are just a few of the questions that intrigue me, and most of them cannot be answered directly, maybe only pondered. In spite of that, these questions have helped me to develop a new body of work using the pieces I studied at the IQSC as a resource and inspiration."

Mary Anne Jordan, Associate Professor of Textiles at the University of Kansas, has taught workshops at Arrowmont, Haystack, Splitrock, University of Iowa, and the Quilt and Surface Design Symposium. Her work has been shown nationally and internationally in Japan, Poland, South America and Canada. 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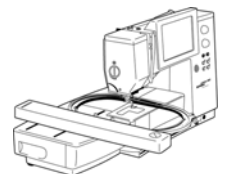
