Melinda has been in love with fabric all of her life and knew when she was 16 years old that she was going to be an artist, which became her major in college. Soon she was off to Hawaii as a flight attendant, a real job that lasted 8 years, and met her husband during this time in the San Francisco Bay Area. She worked in the interior design field for 15 years as a fabric and wallpa-

per designer. She and her husband, Joe, started their own wallpaper and fabric design business soon after the birth of their son, Matthew, in 1988.

The company, *Melinda Bula Designs*, sold their hand silk-screened wallpapers and fabrics nationwide. Melinda's wallpaper and fabric designs have been featured on the covers of Better Homes and Garden magazine as well as Sunset design books in addition to other noted publications.

Since moving to the Sacramento area in 1996, she has been involved in guilting and wearable arts, which has always been her first love. Her sense of color and design has won her numerous awards for both guilts and wearable arts. Her wearable arts are dynamic and modern and she loves to experiment with new techniques. Her Fabulous Fusible Flowers guilts are unique. With the wonderful look of a painting, she uses fabric and thread to create beautifully artistic quilts. She has been lecturing and teaching, both in the United States and internationally, which she really loves and has been featured on *The Quilt Show*. Creating and designing is an obsession with Melinda and whether it is fabric, wallpaper, or quilts, it is her passion.

She has written 2 books on her Fabulous Fusible Flowers technique, Cutting Garden Quilts and Candy Cane Lane, both published by the Martingale Company.

The deep rich colors of the clematis are intense from its smooth folded petals to its large leaves. I love the spiky stamen in the center. It reminds me of a swirling skirt on the dance floor. This beautiful art quilt can be made in any color you like. Melinda will teach you her fusible flower appliqué technique and help you chose the right colors to make this flower look real. You will use Melinda's book Cutting Garden Quilts to make a color chart with your favorite colors. This is like a fusible paint-by-numbers technique...and it's fun! All skill levels are welcome.

Tweezers or stiletto to help you move small pieces around

1 yd clear plastic vinyl, medium weight - similar to the product used to protect tables and chairs - we will use it to make a pattern overlav

Straight pins with glass heads

Rotary cutter, rulers, and mat

Sharpie markers, fine tip and bold tip, in black

4 yds **Steam-A-Seam 2**, preferably 18" width (or whatever you can find)

Plastic baggie - to keep your pattern pieces in

Foam core board, size 19 x 24 – to use as a design board (optional)

Minutes of the Lincoln Quilters Guild - November 11, 2012

College View Seventh-Day Adventist Church - Lincoln, Nebraska

President Sandy Anderson called the meeting to order at 7 PM with a welcome and a reminder that there will be no meetings in December, January, and February. The next Guild meeting is March 11, 2013 - the day after daylight savings time returns. She wished everyone happy holidays. Vice-president Vicky Skuodas introduced speaker Ann Peterson who presented her "History of an Obsessive Quilter." Following the presentation, Bonnie Kucera, winner of the Guildsponsored Best of the County award at the Lancaster County fair, showed her winning Log Cabin guilt, which has 13,355 pieces.

The business meeting was convened. There being no additions or corrections, the Minutes of the October 9, 2012 meeting were approved as printed in *Plain Print*, and the Treasurer's report was remanded for audit.

Elizabeth Sterns reported on the 2012 Quilt Show. She noted that fewer vendors participated because they were at the AQS Kansas City show or the Machine Quilters Show, and the cost of the venue was also slightly higher. Less revenue from vendors and higher costs impacted the bottom line, with a net income of \$8,491 being significantly less than in 2010 and 2008. Nevertheless, more than \$10,000 was earned by the silent and live auctions; this is a record high. The book sale was especially popular. Elizabeth recognized all of the volunteers and the presenters, Peg Pennell and Barbara Caron. She noted that remaining T-shirts will be available for purchase at the March meeting. Committee chairs were asked to submit their reports to Elizabeth. Treasurer Christina Chapman explained that she had prepared and distributed a quarterly report to the committee chairs. Because the guilt show brought in about \$7,500 less than anticipated, it is necessary to reduce expenditures to match revenue. The Board will review the budget and each chairperson is asked to identify possible reductions. Christina also noted that 40% of past members have not yet renewed, and encouraged them to do so. Additional revenue can also be raised by greater participation in classes/workshops and by supporting

revenue generating projects such as the mini raffle.

relevant websites. Vice President Vicky
Skoudas announced the speaker for
the March 11, 2013 meeting. Melinda
Bula will present "Discovering the Artist
Within Through Quilts and Wearable
Art. Her "Clematis" workshop will be on
Tuesday; space is still available.

Announcements. President-elect Linda Daiker made the following announcements. A Thank You note was received for a cuddle quilt; see it on the Bulletin Board. Dues are due now - \$25 for regular members and \$15 for those age 65 and older. See Joni Saurter to check your membership status and to pay dues. Jerry Orbist is looking for a good home for his wife's guilting frame; see the Bulletin Board table for information. Condolences were sent to the family of Sandy Meyerburg. The next deadline for Plain Print is February 13. Sign up to volunteer for National Quilting Day on March 16. "Quilted Conscience" will be screened at the UNL City Campus Union on November 13 at 7 PM: a discussion with the filmmaker and master guilter will follow. Willa Smith will host a get together for new members at 6:30 PM on Tuesday, November 20 at the Bernina Sewing Studio. The Fiber Funatics will hold a boutique at the Bernina Sewing Studio from Thursday, November 15 through Saturday, November 17. Picky up a flyer about Ann Peterson's classes on Craftsy. Holders and folders are needed; sign up with Donna Jensen. The American Quilt Study Group sent a Thank You note to those who helped with the October conference. Two quests were welcomed.

Reports. Vicky Skoudas talked about Cuddle Quilts, which have been a guild project for more than 20 years. A total of 366 quilts were given last year, mostly in the Lincoln area to such places as Cedars, People's City Mission, Health & Human Services, and hospitals. Quilts are given to adults

as well as children. The need continues. Members are encouraged to pick up a kit or sandwich to be stitched and returned in March. More than a dozen completed Cuddle Quilts were shown.

Joyce Pope spoke about the Santa Socks project. Many socks and items to put in them were donated this year. Four socks were up for voting and brought in \$126. The first place sock was made by Anne Parrot; second place by Vicky Skoudas, and third place by Carol Rystrom.

Gloria Smith and Pam Wakeman reported on the Friendship Block activity in which 11 people made 98 blocks. Winners of these blocks were Carolyn Kitterer, Kathleen Phillips, Mary Kermmoade, Jayne Wolfe, Joyce Pope, and Arlene Lynn [2 sets]. A new block will be introduced in March, with the drawing in April.

Barbara Brown and Kathy Spitsen conducted the Mini-Raffle, which generated \$136.50 for the Santa Socks service project. Rosalind Carr won the cup wall hanging/place mats donated by Sandy Anderson. Kathleen Phillips won the Santa wall hinging made by Vicky Skoudas. Kathy Spitsen won the nutcracker and a book titled "Wow! Wool on Wool Folk Art Quilts" donated by Kathy Phillips.

Sue McKee reported that the spring mystery bus trip to lowa quilt shops will be April 12-13, 2013. Contact her for more information.

Meeting adjourned to Show and Tell at 8:22 PM.

Upcoming events at the Museum: 'Posing with Patchwork'

Historic photographs do more than capture a moment in time. They tell a story. "Posing with Patchwork: Quilts in Photographs, 1855-1955," a new exhibition at the International Quilt Study Center & Museum will explore the larger, human story conveyed in historic photographs of quilts.

"Vintage photographs remind us that quilts have always been a part of our daily life," said Marin Hanson, IQSCM Curator of Exhibitions. "People felt they were special enough to include them in photographically documenting themselves, their families and their lives. Quilts were an important aspect of people's lives for as long as photographs have been around."

Janet Finley, author of "Quilts in Everyday Life, 1855-1955: A 100-Year Photographic History," will guest curate the exhibition.

"Posing with Patchwork" will match a selection of vintage photographs with quilts from the IQSCM collection that are similar to the ones featured in the vintage photos. It opens March 1 and will run through Dec. 1.

The public is invited to the grand opening of the exhibition March 1. In conjunction with LincolnArtwalk's First Friday, the exhibition, and museum, will be open free of admission from 4:30-7 p.m. During the reception, visitors can enjoy a performance by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln East Campus Choir and view a special display of the UNL Quilt Show.

In addition, Quilt House will celebrate its fifth anniversary with refreshments in the Reception Hall.

Upcoming Symposium Explores Context, Meaning April 26-27, 2013

Quilts hold myriad meanings, a theme that will be explored in the International Quilt Study Center & Museum's sixth biennial symposium, April 26-27. "Quilts In Context: The Making of Meaning," will offer attendees an understanding of the circumstances and settings in which quilts were made and used

"By examining American quilts in their shared contexts within their domestic settings, juxtaposed with fashionable dress and furnishings of the periods, symposium participants will gain a deeper understanding of the people who made, used and cherished quilts for the past 200 years," said Patricia Crews, Willa Cather professor of textiles and IQSCM director.

The program will feature tie-ins to museum exhibitions, including "Posing with Patchwork: Quilts in Photographs,

1855-1955" and "Perfecting the Past: Colonial Revival Ouilts."

Invited speakers include:

Lynne Bassett is an independent scholar specializing in New England's historic costume and textiles. Formerly curator of textiles at Old Sturbridge Village, she is the author of several award-winning books, including Northern Comfort: New England's Early Quilts, 1780-1850: from the Collection of Old Sturbridge Village and Massachusetts Quilts: Our Common Wealth. In each book she uses quilts to provide a window through which to view the history of the state or region, telling stories of international trade and domestic manufacture, national politics and neighborly discourse. Her latest book is Homefront and Battlefield: Quilts & Context in the Civil War.

<u>Linda Eaton</u> is the John L. & Marjorie P. McGraw director of collections and senior curator of textiles at Winterthur Museum & Country Estate, the ancestral home of Henry Francis du Pont. She also teaches in the University of Delaware Program in Art Conservation. She is the author of *Quilts in a Material World*, which presents Winterthur's renowned collection of early nineteenth century quilts. She vividly describes how the economics and politics of the time affected quilt materials and design in the new republic.

Joan Severa, curator emeritus of costume at the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, is the author of several books including My Likeness Taken and Dressed for the Photographer: Ordinary Americans and Fashion, 1840-1900, which garnered the prestigious Davenport Award from the Costume Society of America. She provides graphic evidence that ordinary Americans, when dressed in their finest attire, appeared very much the same as their wealthier neighbors. Yet subtle clues when carefully read betray their economic circumstances. Her books provide extensive information for understanding the social history and material culture of 19th century America.

In addition, special presentations and tours will be provided by Janet Finley, author of *Quilts in Everyday Life, 1855-1955: A 100-Year Photographic History* and Don Beld, founder of the Home of the Brave Quilt Project, a group of volunteers who make quilts for families of fallen service members — quilts inspired by those made during the American Civil War. Attendees will participate in curator-led tours of the latest exhibitions and a behind-the-scenes tour of the museum.

Registration fees are \$125 for museum members and \$170 for non-members. Fees cover all lectures, tours, special sessions, an informal fashion show featuring designs by UNL Apparel Design students, receptions, coffee breaks and luncheons. Visit www.QuiltStudy.org for registration and information.

Binding Techniques

(From Deb's Blog) Bindings

One of the things I have noticed in my ventures around the country, quilt bindings are the nemesis of many of us. However, bindings do NOT have to be an adversary. Trust me. I, like a vast majority of you quilters out there, fought the perfect binding with my heart and soul. <g> I figured I would muddle through and, like my other quilting techniques, it would improve with age. Wrong!

Think about this: You've spent weeks getting it to the point of binding. You've cut, sewn, (ripped some?) quilted, quilted some more and now you're ready to bind and sleeve your quilt. Why not give it the same attention you did during the entire creative process? I was extremely fortunate when <a href="Schamber finally taught me how to do a really fabulous binding and my finished quilts improved dramatically. I know...I know...I'm stubborn. I should have sought out a better way to do them much earlier on but as they say, it's never too late to learn something.

This means so much to me that I'd like to offer a free binding class to any guild I go to. I'm amazed at how many very experienced quilters out there simply never embraced (or were taught) a good binding technique. Are we all just so tired of looking at our quilts during the making process that we run out of steam by the time we get to the bindings? Well...that doesn't have to be the case.
