

Minutes of the Lincoln Quilters Guild - November 11, 2013

College View Seventh-Day Adventist Church - Lincoln, Nebraska

President Sandy Anderson called the meeting to order at 7 PM with a welcome. She reminded everyone to silence cell phones. Photos may not be taken during the PowerPoint portion of the presentation. Vice-President Vicky Skuodas introduced Dorothy Heidemann-Nelson and her Trunk Show of functional and "dysfunctional" guilts.

Mary Sedlak reviewed 2014 speakers and workshops as listed on a bookmark placed on each chair. She showed examples of the types of projects planned for the March and April workshops.

The business meeting convened at 8:00 PM. There being no additions or corrections, the Minutes of the October 2013 meeting were approved as printed in *Plain Print*, and the October 2013 Treasurer's report was remanded for audit.

a vendor at the Quilt Expo.

Announcements: President-elect Linda Daiker made the following announcements: Thank you notes were received from Lora Rocke (October speaker), Kris Vierra (State Fair Award recipient), and Sheila Green (Life Member Award recipient). Cuddle quilt kits can be picked up tonight, completed, and returned at the March meeting. The 2015 incoming Vice Presidents want input for speakers; pick up and complete a purple form to share your ideas. The Quilted Conscience Project still needs funds to cover the cost of guilting the project, which will be hung at Sheldon Art Gallery in the spring. February 14, 2014 is the next newsletter deadline. Eight visitors were welcomed. Items for the website must be approved by the President: contact Linda Daiker prior to submitting an item for

posting. The 2014 State Fair guidelines have changed (categories and number of categories in which a quilt can be shown.) More information will be included in the next newsletter.

Friendship Blocks. Gloria Smith announced that two people had stitched 10 blocks. The winner was Jane Grabenstein-Chandler. Gloria also reminded everyone that the 2014 Quilt Show challenge quilt has a size limitation of 16x20-inches; she encouraged everyone to participate.

Mini-Raffle. Barb Brown and Kathy Spitsen conducted the Mini-Raffle, with proceeds of \$154 going to the Santa Socks project. Winners were: Deb Scherer - a hand-stitched project book, scissors, hoop, and needle provided by an anonymous donor; Sheila Warren - a tree wall hanging donated by Joni Sauter; Rosalind Carr – a basket of jams and jellies donated by Sandy Wade & a green clutch purse donated by Caren Wagner; and Annie Nygren (daughter of Megan Patent-Nygren) a guilt book and "Cold Winter Noses" kit.

Santa Socks. Twenty-three socks were included in the voting and many more were made for the project. Voting brought in \$250 to purchase items for the socks. First place winner was Patty Shelley, second place was Kathy Spitsen, and third place was Jaynee Wolfe.

Quilt Fest. Pam Rowland thanked everyone who helped at Quilt Expo, where 125 quilt raffle tickets were sold. That brings to 1,531 the total number sold prior to guild night. See Pam for tickets. Vicky Skuodas, auction chair, reminded everyone that donations are needed, and she showed the first donation. Mary Swinton, member of the steering committee, announced that Sue McKee needs donations of bed sheets for set up and take down. Four months

remain to work on auction quilts, challenge quilts, or regular entries. Mary reviewed the categories and noted that one must be a member in order to enter a quilt in the show. Sheila Green remarked that the value of the double booth LQG had at Quilt Expo was \$1,400, but was free in exchange for hanging more than 50 quilts. She thanked those who hung and took down that show.

National Quilting Day at the IQSCM. Eighty volunteers are needed on Saturday, March 15. Provide your contact information to Sheila Green and she will be in touch to schedule a time to volunteer. Sheila reviewed the program for the day, including speakers and demonstrations. NQD is sponsored by LQG and NSQG, with two commercial sponsors in 2014: HandiQuilter and AccuQuilt.

Rule Changes for Quilts Displayed at Nebraska State Fair

There are two important rule changes for quilts displayed at the Nebraska State Fair starting in 2014.

- 1. A quilt previously entered in any one of the Divisions 5320, 5330 or 5390 (one person quilts, group quilts or special contests) will no longer be eligible to compete a second or third year in any of these divisions regardless of the placing the quilt received at previous Nebraska State Fairs. Note that this rule change does not affect entries in Best-in-County Contest, Division5391 where the entry can be brought back a second year to the Quilt Department if entered in Division 5320, 5330 or 5390 or vice versa provided that the quilt still meets the 3-year completion date rule.
- 2. It is no longer required that all persons involved in making a group quilt (Division 5330) be Nebraska residents. We will still require that the primary maker or makers of the quilt top be Nebraska residents, but the quilting portion (the layering of the top, batting and back together) will no longer have to be done by a Nebraska resident. In the past, the NSF Quilt Department required that all portions of all entries including the guilting had to be done by a Nebraska resident. We recognize that this was limiting to many, especially to those living close to our state borders where a member of a group making the top or the commercial quilter of choice was not a Nebraska resident. For this reason, we are relaxing the residency requirement. Note that, as in the past, all entries in Division 5320 (one person guilts) must still be made by Nebraska residents only. 
