The "Nebraska Is America" Quilt made by the Lincoln Quilters Guild for the American Bicentennial in 1976 was formally unveiled at the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, Sunday afternoon, March 18.

The unveiling was performed by Miriam Hecox who was chairman of the design committee. Millie Corkill, President, gave an interesting review of the making of the quilt. It hangs in the stairwell off the main lobby and is enclosed in a glass-covered shadow box.

Also participating in the ceremony were Clinton Hoover, Director, Nebraska Center For Continuing Education; Norman Geske, Director of Sheldon Art Gallery; and Quentin Geffner, Dean of Continuing Studies.

The quilt was given by the Guild to the Sheldon Art Gallery through the University of Nebraska Foundation

Some changes were suggested in the categories, such as adding "Old Tops Newly Quilted" to "Antique," and adding "Machine Applique" to "Machine Quilting."

The Lincoln Quilters Guild will provide a \$10.00 prize for two new categories:

- 1. First Quilt.
- Non-functional (wall quilts, crazy quilts, and picture quilts).

These prizes were approved by the guild at the March meeting.

The Guild Fair Committee hopes to arrange for demonstrations at the fair of various quilting techniques such as Cathedral Window, Quilt-Asyou-Go, Continuous Bias Binding, Hoop Quilting, etc.
