#### Pieces Bits

I have found that cardboard tubes are handy for storing linens. I have several antique linen items that I don't like to fold. Instead, I wrap them around cardboard tubes before putting them in the drawer. Wrapping-paper tubes work well for wide items, such as dresser scarves and pillowcases, and papertowel tubes are good for smaller items. You can avoid creases in your treasured quilts during storage by rolling them ardand carpet tubes. For extra care, cover tubes and wrap linens in acid-free tissue paper. This will help prevent deterioration of the fabric.

On September 11, the members of the Quilt Project Committee Nebraska completed the last Quilt History Day for the summer at Nebraska City. The final figures include Bancroft, 172 quilts; Blair, 329; Wahoo, 219; and Nebraska City, 172. The total quilts registered at Quilt History Days is 2,690. A few have been registered quilts correspondence. As a result of this project, a repository has been found for a quilt belonging to the family of former Governor Griswold.

Each site has yielded exceptional quilts. The oldest quilt was registered at Bancroft -- a 1792 glazed wool, fragile condition, and at Nebraska City we saw a beautiful crazy, circa 1955-1860, made in Westphalia, Germany, brought to this country about 1864.

Pat Hackley reports that \$550 has been given to the Jean Harnsberger Memorial.

Jennie Chinn, representative National Endowment for the Arts, spent the day with us in Bancroft. She felt the Nebraska Quilt Project has a number of strengths, the major of which include (1) the same team goes to each site, building in consistency; (2) the number of sites is small, keeping the Project manageable; (3) the same woman (Mary Ghormley) works at the station that determines the amount of data to be gathered on each quilt; and collected material is reviewed within a month of the day it was collected.

Two areas that need to be strengthened are (1) employing a folklorist for more input, and (2) fundraising.

Mrs. Chinn noted that only one Quilters Guild had contributed to the Nebraska Quilt Project and she feels it important that other Guilds contribute And the Project needs additional donations from individuals businesses. It has been suggested that Guilds have a doll guilt raffle with proceeds going to the Nebraska Quilt In Kansas and other states, Project. donations have been solicited in the name of the one who inspired today's quiltmaker. At Blair one such participant to Quilt History Day made a donation in the name of the maker of her lovely old quilts.

There is considerable work yet to be done for the Project. The final reports must be sent to Washington D.C., and once the secretarial work is completed you will be hearing from us again.

Finally, I would like to mention that we have had hard working chairmen at each site along the way, the volunteers who worked with us have been dedicated, and we all feel that we have made some new friends.


Thanks to all who brought cookies to the reception and also for the canned foods which were donated to the Food Pantry.





# NOVEMBER FRIENDSHIP BLOCK




Friendship Block Nine-Patch 12" block

- 4. Colors may lean toward Fall.


