## "HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS" QUILT SHOW





"Sew" goes the life of a quilter!




#### HOME FOR THE HOLIDAYS RAFFLE QUILT

#### NOVEMBER FRIENDSHIP BLOCK - SPOOLS

We chose a simple block that you'll enjoy putting together as a diversion from your holiday projects. Repeat the 4" spool block four times. Arrange them as shown. A "scrapbag look" is desirable.


#### Remember:

Use 100% cotton fabrics, prewashed. Add 1/4" seam allowances to all templates. Measure accurately! Press all pieces as you go.

#### Instructions:

For each 4" spool block, choose a stripe fabric for the "thread" (the square piece). Coordinate it with a solid fabric for the two ends of the spool and a light-colored solid fabric for the background. Make four different 4" spool blocks. Set them together as shown.

Don't forget to press your finished block. Make sure it measures 8 1/2" square (which includes seam allowances). And, finally, affix your name to it with tape or a pinned-on label.



For those of us unable to squeeze into Mona Jeanne's demonstration (Sept. meeting), Mona Jeanne has outlined the directions for us.

10 Steps to Easy Prairie Points by Doreen - Bernina - Manhattan, KS

Quilt size 3" - Doll quilt 1 1/2"

- 1. Prepare strip of fabric twice as wide as the square
- 2. mark strip in half lengthwise
- 3. measure and mark squares along top half of strip.
- measure and mark squares along bottom half of strip (be sure to mark exactly halfway between squares of top half)
- 5. snip from edges to center, both top and bottom
- 6. beginning at one end, fold all squares to the right, forming
- 7. beginning at the same end, fold all squares to the left, forming
- 8. flip each triangle toward center
- 9. sandwich lower triangle between legs of upper triangle.
- 10. sandwich upper triangle between legs of lower triangle.

The State Guild Raffle Quilt "top" will soon be finished (thanks to **Shelly Burge**) and Shelly is setting up the quilt frame in her home. If anyone has some free time around mid October and would like to go over to her house and stitch, please call her at 489-7141.



The most asked question about the quilt challenge has been "where can I buy more of the challenge fabric?"

To answer that, we must explain that our original order for two bolts of fabric fell through the Friday before our first meeting. With a good deal of luck and with the help of Northwest Fabric (plus the Shelly-Pam-Ruth fabric shuttle), we were able to purchase about 30 yards of our first-choice fabric. All of that was sold or spoken for at the September meeting. Then Kathi Kinnaman took on the new challenge and found another length of the fabric in Iowa.

So those of you looking for more fabric -- Good Luck! Part of the challenge is to manage with the half-yard, or use your own fabric connections.

To clarify the design limitation you were assigned: remember that this is to be used as a starting point: how creative can you be working within that guideline? The idea is to see the different ways six to eight of you take the same limitation and use it to create your own unique quilt with the chosen fabric and no more than seven fabrics of your choice.
