"American Quilts: A Century of Change, 1800-1900" will be featured March 14 through April 4 in the Gallery of the Textiles, Clothing and Design Department located in the Home Economics Building on the UNL East Campus. The exhibition will feature nineteenth century quilts from the collections of Lincoln Quilt Guild members, Sara Dillow and Mary Ghormley. Many technological changes in the printing of textiles occurred during the nineteenth century and are reflected in these quilts. Viewers can see rainbow prints, copper plate prints, penciling, block prints, early roller prints, double pinks, madder-style prints, not to mention the glorious patterns and amazing quilting found in quilts of this era.

The opening reception is planned for Saturday, March 16, 1996 from 3:00-5:00 PM. This precedes the LQG Annual Quilt Show and Auction. So plan to make an afternoon of it and help us celebrate the opening of this exhibit.

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Cabin Fever Day

Cabin Fever Day is the Saturday to get out and see WHAT CAN A SHOE FLY DO? with Paulette Peters. Paulette will show quilters of all skill levels this pattern's versatility with three arrangements and several sizes:

- A wall piece with the illusion of several optical layers, SHOW FLY WINDOWS, lets you "look into" the quilt. Muslin and scraps are needed for this quilt.
- POSITIVE-NEGATIVE SHOO FLY is a quilt made with only two contrasting fabrics, prints or plains.
- Nine light fabrics, nine dark fabrics, and nine medium to dark fabrics are needed for the TIPPED OVER SHOW FLY.

Paulette is a talented, prolific quiltmaker whose quilts have appeared in many national exhibits and publications. Her books are quilter-friendly. She lives in Elkhorn, Nebraska.

Repiecing The Past

TOAD IN A PUDDLE arrives in time for April showers. Sara Dillow will show you how to piece this traditional block using "time saving" quilting tools. Patterns from twelve antique quilts in the Dillows' collection have been published in Sara's book, including Toad in a Puddle. Sara has an interest in all aspects of quilting including writing about, speaking about, photographing, and preserving quilts; and making quilting friends. Sara lives in Fremont, Nebraska.



2. Return forms by Feb 1 1996

3. Limit 3 (three) entered items per LQG member. Note order of priority if we cannot show all your quilts.

4. No entries are to have been shown in any previous LQG show.

5. Place each entry in a fabric bag which has on it your name, address and phone number.

6. Insurance for quilts will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Check with your insurance representative.

7. All entries must have been made or completed by a Lincoln Quilt Guild Member. (except for antique display)

8. A name label must be sewn on the back of each entered item.

9. By entering my quilt in this show, I give permission for photos to be taken of it.

Don't forget your auction donation please turn those in by guild meeting night - March 11th. Sign up sheets for white-glovers and registration table workers will be passed around at the January guild meeting. Perhaps your small group would like to work together on the same shift.

Minutes of the Nov. 13, 1995 LQG Meeting held at the Seventh Day Adventist Church, 7:00 pm

The Lincoln Quilters Guild met Monday, November 13, 1995 at the Seventh Day Adventist Church at 7 PM. Linda Mager called the meeting to order and welcomed members and guests.
