The first request is from the Lincoln Community Playhouse. The Playhouse would like to display quilts of all sizes in their Gallery Showcase from mid November to the third week of December. The quilts displayed need to have ANGELS in them, but not necessarily in a Christmas theme.

## By Popular Demand

Skor Cookies Served at the September Meeting from Betty Tenhulzen
recipe from the 1975 Children's Memorial Hospital Cookbook

48 graham crackers ( $21 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 13 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ )
1 c. butter
1 c. brown sugar
1 c. finely chopped nuts
Heat oven to $350^{\circ}$
Place crackers already separated on the "divided line"; fill pan completely so there are no spaces. Melt butter in saucepan. Then add sugar and bring to rolling boil. Boil exactly 2 minutes. Pour butter and sugar mixture over crackers. Sprinkle on nuts. Bake for 10 minutes exactly. Remove from pan as soon as possible and cool on piece of foil.
Note: you can also sprinkle chocolate chips on top of the hot cookies. Spread the chocolate after it starts melting.

## NQA Funds Committee Report

The committee composed of Sandy Anderson, Pat Hackley, Judy Lane, Kate Laucomer, Wendy Ray, and Lois Wilson presented their findings at the September 8, 1997 meeting. Jean Davie served as consultant to the committee.

When the committee was announced last spring, President Becky Haynes asked for suggestions and ideas for use of the funds. Based on all the responses received, the focus has been toward the International Quilt Study Center at UNL and the James Collection.

You should be receiving a brochure in the mail outlining the opportunities available for the "Adopt a Quilt" program. This is a way to give funds toward the $\$ 2$ million that must be raised by the University Foundation to meet the terms set out by Mr. And Mrs. James. A guild may adopt a quilt by giving $\$ 1000$. For this, the guild would receive a photo, description, and history of the quilt. This money would be counted as part of the matching funds being raised by the Foundation.

A second option would be to give the $\$ 5000$ toward a quilt display case in the hallway area near the quilt storage center. There would be a designation by the case that funds were contributed by LQG. This money would not be counted as part of the matching funds being raised by the Foundation.

To meet the goal of doing something special for the Guild membership, we propose that the funds in excess of $\$ 5000$ be used to purchase books/videos for the LQG library. These would be purchased and presented throughout this Guild year as part of the celebration of our $25^{\text {th }}$ anniversary.

Option One:
Adopt 5 quilts for $\$ 5000$ and purchase books for LQG library.

Option Two:
Donate $\$ 5000$ toward a display case and purchase books for LQG library.

A vote will be taken at the October $13^{\text {th }}$ meeting. The vote will be by written ballot, available only to LQG members present at that meeting. In the case of a tie, the final decision will be made by the Board and the NQA Funds Committee.

## Pumpkin Bread

2-2/3 C. Sugar
$2 / 3 \mathrm{C}$. Oil
4 Eggs
2 C. Canned
Pumpkin
$31 / 2$ C. Flour
2 tsp. Soda
I tsp. Baking powder
$1 / 2$ tsp. Salt
I tsp. Cinnamon
$1 / 2$ tsp. Cloves
Combine sugar, oil, eggs and pumpkin. Combine flour, soda, baking powder, salt, cloves, and cinnamon; add to sugar mixture. Pour into 2 regular sized loaf pans or 6 small loaf pans sprayed with no-stick spray. Bake at 350 degrees for $50-60$ minutes.

## New Notions <br> submitted by Creative Hands

1. Under Thimble - Use this small stainless steel disc to protect your under finger from needle pricks. It sticks to your finger with reusable adhesive, but allows you to feel the pressure of the needle. Tested and recommended by Martha.
2. Stitch \& Ditch Stabilizer - Great tear away paper for foundation piecing and for machine quilting. Tested my Millie and Wendy.
3. Ebon Rotary Cutter Blade Guard Covers blade area of 45 mm cutters with hitech fabric foam using Velcro closures. Especially good for cutters with pressure moveable blade guards.
4. Richard Hemming and Son Betweens Reported to be the \#1 rated quilting needle. Made in England. Tested and recommended by Martha and Wendy.
5. John James Magnetop Thimble Comfortable metal thimble comes in three sizes. Martha uses the magnet to keep track of her needle when doing needlework.

October Leaf Friendship Block (71/2" block or $8^{\prime \prime}$ with seam allowance) *** templates on next page

This block is from QUILTMAKER \#51 Sept/Oct 1996 with cutting techniques changed slightly.

PLEASE use ONLY 100\% cotton, prewashed fabrics!

LEAF FABRICS = fall colors like rust, burgundy, golds, teals, and maybe even purple, etc.

BACKGROUND = any beige or tan print fabric.

For each block cut:
Background:
1 pc. 3 1/2" square A
2 pcs. $2 \times 3$ 1/2" rectangle B
6 pcs. $2^{\prime \prime}$ square C
2 pcs. Template D \& DR

## Leaf fabrics:

6 pcs. $2 \times 3$ 1/2" rectangle E
1 pc. template $F$
1 pc. 2" square G
1 bias strip 1 1/4' x $4^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{H}$
Don't forget to use your plaid somewhere in the leaf block!

To piece unit E to unit C layout rectangles as follows:


Place a 2" background square on top, with right sides together. Stitch as shown \& press open. This will yield the unit and its mirror image.

To make leaf stem, press the bias strip length wise with right sides together. Sew a $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ seam along the long side. Turn stem and press with the seam in back. Insert stem in the seam just before stitching. Hand applique stem to secure in place, tuck in raw edge at end of stem.

Using the templates on the next page, cut and sew pieces together with $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ seams to make upper corner of leaf block.

NOTE: Seam allowance IS included in the templates.

## Friendship Block Fabric !!

IF you purchased plaid fabric at the Sept. meeting, then that plaid should be included in your exchange block.

HOWEVER, if you missed the meeting or the fabric, FEAR NOT !! We will accept all blocks, but you must use a plaid from your own stash. Those blocks will be put in a special drawing. Depending on the number of blocks turned in, they may be held for a future month and may contain an assortment of blocks.

## Size: 32 " $\times 68$ "

First of all, let me thank you for the opportunity to give this anniversary gift to the Guild.

The banner was constructed using over 100 different fabrics and took about 25 hours to complete. I designed the banner on graph paper. First using a colored pencil to indicate the colors I wanted to use. I cut all the pieces and places them on the design board before I sewed any seams. It includes a rainbow effect achieved by using a watercolor method which was chain pieced by Barbara Schlegelmilch. All of the quilting was done by machine with the binding being applied by hand.

The use of the rainbow was intended to represent the beautiful array of people involved in our Guild. Our variety is exhibited in a myriad of styles, skills, and passions.

The quilt contains the following
 blocks:

## Nebraska Windmill

This block was done in traditional colors and represents our ties to the past. The light parts of this block were intended to provide illumination to the entire banner. The block was constructed by machine using rotary cut templates.

## Memory

This was chosen to remind us of all those who have been important to us in quilting and the things we have learned through them. The piecing was done on the machine using template free construction methods. It is surrounded with a quilted feathered heart to show our love.

## Calico Star

The Calico Star was chosen to remind us of our roots in quilting and the women who had only calicoes to use to create their masterpieces. Although no masterpiece, this block was hand pieced from hand cut templates.

## Sunflower

The sunflower represents friendship, sisterhood, and growth. The circle shows the eternal nature of these friendships. The block was machine pieced with an appliqued center.
$20^{\text {th }}$ Century
I placed this block at the end of the banner as we approach the end of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century with a view to the future. It was both hand and machine appliqued. The colors from this block flow into the paper pieced sections that contain the quilt Lincoln Quilters Guild name.

The blocks overlap each other just as our skills, views, and quilts overlap and influence each other. We are a unique membership. Even though our skill levels vary from the beginner to the long time quilter, each of us has something to offer, to learn, and to benefit from this community of quilters.

## Minutes

Lincoln Quilters Guild September General Meeting
Sept. 8,1997 7 p.m. Old Cheney Alliance Church, 5201 Old Cheney Rd.

President Connie Strope called the meeting to order and welcomed all.

Wendy Ray explained that a concert at the Seventh Day Adventist Church at the same time as this meeting was the reason for the change of location. Connie thanked Lila and Clarence Heiser for their help at the church and Wendy Ray and Kathi Kinnaman for their help in making the change.

Sandy Anderson shared a "Silver Moment" with the guild, telling events that have happened since the founding of the guild twenty-five years ago. There will be a "Silver Moment" at each of the meetings this year.

Lora Rocke explained the meaning of the new guild banner. The rainbow concept represents all of us, the Memory block remembering past quilters, Calico Star - the past and beginning, Sunflower - growth, Twentieth Century - moves into the arc in the lower right symbolizing the future.

Sheryl Jonas introduced Ricky Tims of St. Louis, Missouri, whose presentation, Design Elements of Art related the arts of quilting and music.

The minutes of the May meeting were approved as printed. Treasurer's report was given.

Karalene Smith reported on the purchase of a new camera, which is user friendly, to replace the complicated camera.

Scholarships randomly drawn for the Ricky Tims class went to Diane Deahl and Marilyn Lockard. Winners of the wall hangings were Gloria Hall, Karalene Smith, and Nancy Evans.

Connie asked the members if we should continue to have Armstrong fabrics for sale. Since the group didn't have strong feeling pro or con, the board will decide.

Martha Dennis asked that each member make and donate a Santa sock, which will be given to the less fortunate.

Kathi Kinnaman reported that the next quilt show will have the theme of forest, which encompasses everything and will be June 12,13, and 14 at Lux Middle School.

Roxann O'Hare showed leaf blocks and reported that she and Sandi Schulze have two plaids available for purchase, to be included in all of the Friendship blocks made this year.

Pat Hackley reported on the work of the committee to decide how to spend the N.Q.A. (National Quilt Association) funds. They based their recommendations on the desire to acknowledge the support of other Nebraska quilters, to spend wisely, and to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the guild. It was moved by Pat 1. That $\$ 5,000$ be spent to adopt five quilts by the Lincoln Quilters Guild, through a gift to the University of Nebraska Foundation, to benefit the International Quilt Study Center, with the remaining funds to be spent to benefit the Lincoln Quilt Guild library during this Guild year. or 2 . That $\$ 5,000$ be given by the Lincoln Quilters Guild, to the University of Nebraska Foundation, to construct a quilt display case in the area of the International Quilt Study Center, with the remaining funds to be spent to benefit the Lincoln Quilt library during this Guild year. The above information will be published in the September Plain Print The election of option 1 or 2 will be by written ballot, open to members of the Lincoln Quilters guild present at the October, 1997 meeting. In the case of a tie the final decision will be made by the Lincoln Quilters Guild Board and this committee. Seconded by Judy Lane. Discussion followed; motion passed.

Martha Lane moved there be an addition to the by-laws of the position of vice president elect. Seconded by Kathi Kinnaman. Discussion followed during which it was explained the need to book national speakers a year or more in advance. Motion carried.

## A Quilters' Guide to Road Trips

One of the many joys of quilting is the road trip (never to be confused with the family vacation!) To qualify as a true QUILTERS' road trip it must be taken with a group of quilting devotees and you must travel in a van or a car with a VERY large trunk.

## RULES OF TRAVELING

1. Packing car...Everything will fit, contrary to your husband's advice. If it comes to a choice between the spare tire and your sewing machine? The spare tire will fit nicely in the garage. We MUST have the essentials.
2. Back seat position...This person is responsible for the distribution of food and other essential items. Also the safest position in the car, as this person is packed in among fabric and quilts. In the event of an accident (heaven forbid), this person will be totally cushioned from impact. Perhaps the auto industry could profit from this idea, since they seem to be having such a problem with airbags.
3. Mileage...This is the most misunderstood measurement of all. Many think it is the number of miles traveled. Incorrecto! Quilters know that it is the number of quilt and antique shops visited per day.
4. Rest Stop...If any ONE person needs to stop for the necessaries, the car must stop. You will never hear "just a little farther".
5. Points of Interest...Anything of interest (even if it is an unplanned stop) may require a go -back or roundabout (explained later in article). Examples...nicely decorated mailbox or barn, quilts in a window or hanging on a clothesline, a pink cow wearing a housedress.
6. Scribe...Person who records all pertinent and interesting information along the way...flocks of butterflies, fields of corn and beans (a quilt block), interstate exit sign

numbers to quilt shops, the Dairy Queen with the biggest Blizzards you ever ate.

## TRAVEL TERMS

1. Direct route...Directly to the nearest quilt shop. Direction has nothing to do with it.
2. Go-back...The act of turning around in the middle of the highway to return to a point of interest (see Points of Interest)
3. Roundabout...The act of driving around the block to return to a point of interest. (see Points of Interest)
4. Destination...(not required) The place you tell your family is the object of the road trip. The location at which you eventually arrive.
5. Itinerary...A list of all the quilt and antique shops within a hundred-mile radius of the main highway.
6. Travel Kit...Just the essentials. Diet pop, chocolate, crackers, fruit, cookies, popcorn, travel bib, map, cellular phone (for making reservations and checking sales)
7. Travel Bib...Essential for in-car snacking. If you do not have one, then a change of clothing is a must.
8. Motel... Overnight stop. A place to unload your day's purchases for evening show-and-tell and plan the next day's route. Some come equipped with a large goat to provide you with a wake-up call at your door.
9. Right on the Way...Any quilt shop that is within a day's drive in any direction from where you are.

## RULES OF PURCHASE

1. Any fabric can be divided and shared among the members of the traveling party.
2. Quilts...First person to grab it and wrestle it to the floor, wins.
3. When in a quilt shop, you must keep a sharp eye for not only your own projects, but the projects of other members in the group.
4. If it's on sale, and you are more than 150 miles from home...buy it!

## BASIC RULES

1. All food eaten on a road trip has a very low calorie content.
2. The Somehow, Somewhere Theory...All purchases will magically fit in the car... on laps, under feet, under seat.
3. Rule of Thumb...When it's time to return home, head out in the opposite direction.

We hope this little tutorial will be helpful to you and your fellow road-trippers. All information in said tutorial has been roadtested, and found to be valid and safe.
