



Fanciful Flowers Quilt Show

Our gardens may be fading into heavy winter sleep, but a new group of quilts from the James Collection at the International Quilt

Study Center has sprouted at the University of Nebraska's Morrill Hall. The quilts, part of the "Fanciful Flowers: Botany & the American Quilt" exhibit that will run until February 2001 reflect the connection between women and botany in the nineteenth century. The second rotation of "Fanciful Flowers" features a number of exceptional quilts. An album quilt, dated 1850, is signed by a number of friends and relatives of Mary Van Pelt of Maryland. Her sister wrote: " My sister, my sweet sister, No tears but tenderness to ever miss me..." The various blocks, framed with a turkey red Garden Maze setting, include delicately interwoven monograms, and appliqued flowers, fruit, and birds. Also included in the exhibit is a Whig Rose quilt that features an appliqued border of intertwining vines on either side of a basket of flowers. The appliqued pieces are stitched down with a tiny buttonhole stitch that appears to be done with a single thread. Bright birds appear ready to pluck berries off of the intricate vines. In a unique touch, the maker created all of the vines except one with both red, ripe berries and green berries. The exception holds two bunches of green berries. See if you can spot this unique note when you visit Morrill Hall! The Cooper Gallery is located on the second floor of Morrill Hall. Museum hours are 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday, 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sundays and holidays. The museum requests a \$2 donation for adult visitors. The Center offers guided tours. 

Internationally Renowned Studio Artist Michael James Joining Ranks of UNL Faculty

Michael James, internationally known for his pieced and quilted fabric constructions, recently accepted an offer to join the Department of Textiles, Clothing & Design, as a Senior Lecturer starting in the Fall of 2000. He will teach introductory and advanced courses in the area of textile design where his more than 25 years of experience as a studio quilt artist will inform his new role as academic instructor providing students an extraordinary opportunity to study and work with someone of his stature.

Having Michael James at the University of Nebraska - Lincoln creates a unique center of learning for those interested in studying the pieced quilt as a medium of expression. With Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Painting and Printmaking (University of Massachusetts at Dartmouth, BFA, 1971, and Rochester Institute of Technology, Rochester, N.Y., MFA, 1973), Michael James is among a group of formally-trained artists who turned in the 1970s from mainstream media to the tactile and sensual appeal that fabric and quilts offer.

He exhibits his work widely in both solo and group exhibitions. His work has been included in invitational shows at the American Craft Museum in New York City; Musee des Arts Decoratifs du Louvre, Paris; Kunstindustrie Museum in Copenhagen; and Galerie Jonas in Switzerland to name a few. His work is represented in the permanent collections of the Renwick Gallery of the National Museum of American Art, Smithsonian Institution, The American Craft Museum, The Museum of the American Quilter's Society, the Newark Museum and others. He was one of five American textile artists invited to participate in the 8th International Trienniale of Tapestry held in 1995 at the Central Museum of Textiles in Lodz, Poland. There his quilt, "The Metaphysics of Action: Entropic Forms," received a jury citation.

Patricia Crews, Professor of Textiles, Clothing & Design and Director of the International Quilt Study Center at the University of Nebraska - Lincoln, said, "We are thrilled to have him join us. It provides extraordinary opportunities for students and for UNL. Students yearning to explore this centuries old art form as a medium for contemporary expression will be drawn to UNL to study with Michael James where they can earn academic credit and achieve their academic goals."

Since that time there have been deposits made to the LQG Checking account totaling \$4,012.86 from memberships, frame rentals and so forth;

There have been expenditures totaling \$4,114.44 including room rental & insurance, newsletter, chairperson, program, Quilt Show and Special Projects expenses. (Special Projects include the Lincoln-Omaha Quilters Retreat, Cuddle and Angel Quilts, County and State Fair awards, and ASQG 2000 activities and those appropriated balances follow separately.);

Leaving current balance in the LQG Checking account of \$4,781.16.

There have been deposits to the Raffle Quilt Checking account totaling \$414,04; and there have been service charges for two months totaling \$10.00; <u>leaving a balance of \$499.04</u>.

As of this afternoon the value of the two CDs stood at \$14,162.32 and \$7,353.44.

Therefore, total assets of the LQG as of 9/13/99 are \$26,795.96.
