LQG Executive Board Notes

At the March general meeting, President Diane Deahl brought two items of business from the Executive Board to the attention of the general membership. One was the board's recommendation that Lincoln Quilters Guild donate \$250 for a membership at the University Place Art Center, in response to their generosity in making space available for our Resource Room. The board asked that a motion to that effect come from the general membership. Motion was made and carried. Monies for this membership can be paid from the amount budgeted for the rental of the room at the Knights of Columbus Hall, an arrangement that ended as of March 1, 2001.

The second item of business was the board's response to several requests for use of the guild's mailing list. The Executive Board passed a motion not to sell or distribute the guild's mailing list to other organizations or businesses for use. This announcement was met with a round of applause in support of the policy. Furthermore, the motion was made, seconded and carried that this be printed in the front of the membership booklet and that it be printed in the newsletter as well.

For those who have asked about the decision not to provide the guild's mailing list for quilt-related mailings, we remind you that the guild has been very generous in allowing events to be publicized in the newsletter and on the bulletin board at meetings. In addition, businesses may purchase ads in the *Plain Print* for a reasonable fee. These are viable ways for information to be distributed to all our members without their names and mailing addresses being used by another organization or business.

LQG's History: To mark one event in LQG's illustrious 28-year history, Elaine Nielsen reported on the Guild's response to the schoolyard massacre in Dunblane Scotland in 1996. In addition to making commemorative quilts for the school and for the victim's families at the time, LQG was asked in the last year to make another quilt that has been completed and sent to Scotland. Documentation on this, including a sample quilt, will be placed in the Guild's files.





Ice Cream Cone Block For the April meeting

For one block:

- 1. Cut one rectangle 4.5 x 6.5" from background fabric.
- 2. If doing fusible applique, trace pieces on fusible. You may reverse the templates. OR not. Your choice.
- 3. Fuse to fabrics. Use bright, hot colors. Cut out.
- 4. Center ice cream cone on background rectangle. Iron pieces in position.
- 5. Do blanket stitch or some other stitch to cover raw edges (by hand or machine). Use a bright, hot colored thread for the applique. OR do applique by hand the old fashioned way!

NOTE: You will need to make one block for your personal bonus quilt. We suggest using black thread for the applique on your personal block.

Upcoming Exhibitions from the International Quilt Study Center

Two new exhibitions from the International Quilt Study Center open this summer in Nebraska. The first, "Chosen with Care: Adopted Quilts from the James Collection" runs May 14th to September 4th at the Robert Hillestad Textiles Gallery in the Home Economics Building on East Campus in Lincoln. The second, "A Flowering of Quilts," runs June 10th to September 16th at the Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney.

Join us on June 1st between 5:00 and 7:00 p.m. for our opening reception for "Chosen with Care." Ardis James will be the featured speaker. The exhibition includes both traditional and contemporary art quilts adopted by individuals supporting the IQSC's Adopt-A-Quilt Program. They include a graphic Windmill Log Cabin quilt, a rich red Poppy quilt created from a Marie Webster pattern or kit, and an original design by Libby Lehman, featuring her unique Thread Play technique. The second exhibition of the International Quilt Study Center will open June 10th at the Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney — just in time for the Nebraska State Quilt Guild's annual convention. Floral quilts were chosen for this exhibit to relate to the state guild's theme, "Quilts are a Forever Garden." 22nd Annual Quilt History Seminar of the American Quilt Study Group

The American Quilt Study Group's twenty-second national conference on quilt research, hosted by the Colonial Piecemakers, is an outstanding educational opportunity for people who love quilts. The weekend gathering, to be held October 12-14, 2001 in Williamsburg, Virginia offers participants a unique forum through which to view quilts from new perspectives, learn from scholars as they present their latest research, and enjoy networking and meeting with professionals in the field.

Our keynote speaker will be Kimberly Smith Ivey, Associate Curator of Textiles for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. Smith's lecture titled "A Room in Itself: Textiles for the Bed, 1750-1850" will provide a general understanding of the multifabric-layers of the bed by discussing the types of fabric chosen for the bed, changes in fabric selection over the years, the relationship of bed textiles to other textiles in the chamber, and how these bed textiles were cut, constructed, and shaped. Emphasis will be on Virginia and the Chesapeake region and middle to upper economic levels.

The seminar features the presentation of juried papers focusing on the history of quilts, quiltmakers, and related topics. Workshops featuring quilt research professionals and questions from the audience will introduce lively topics of interest to the quilt community throughout the weekend.

Pre-seminar activities take place on Friday of seminar weekend. Two study centers will be offered, one on the early history and marking of whole cloth quilts and another on chintz panels. Tours of Colonial Williamsburg will include the textile lab and main textile storage in the Wallace Collections and Conservation Building of Colonial Williamsburg.


