INTRODUCING MARY CAMPBELL GHORMLEY....

To the longtime members of Lincoln Quilters Guild there is no need of introduction to Mary Ghormley. However, to more recent members they may not have had the opportunity to know and to work with this special lady who has contributed so much to the world of quilting.



In QUILTING NEBRASKA (a documentary produced by Nebraska Public TV in 1999) Mary is featured as "the Grandmother of Quilting in Nebraska". She says in the film that she started quilting in 1960 and was mostly self-taught because there were no classes and not many people were quilting. Mary went on to organize and teach quilting classes in her home. She gave many women the opportunity to learn basic quilting when there was no other resource available. Many of these students became early members of the Lincoln Quilters Guild.

Mary, with her friends, Louise Howey, Hazel Myers and Betty Voss,

organized the Lincoln Quilters Guild in 1973. Mary served as Vice President, then as President in 1974, and remains an active member today. You will usually see her seated in the front row at the monthly meetings, often next to Louise Howey. Mary is very willing to contribute her time, talent and resources to help the Guild. In the ly Guild years she wrote and published the PLAIN PRINT in her home. She served as publicity chair for the Nebraska Symposium 25 years ago. As a member of the Nebraska Quilt Project she traveled the state for 3 years helping to document over 5000 quilts. Mary gave countless hours to the production of the award winning book, NEBRASKA QUILTS AND QUILTMAKERS, that documented the Project.

In addition, she worked on the NQA Show which Lincoln hosted in 1991 and the 2 annual meetings of the American Quilt Study Group hosted by the Lincoln Quilters Guild. On several occasions Mary has graciously opened her home to members of these groups to share hospitality and her wonderful collections.

Mary often presents programs on quilts and quilting in Lincoln and throughout Nebraska. COUNTRY HOME, LADIES' PATCHWORK CIRCLE and KIPPLINGER'S MAGAZINE have all featured Mary in their publications as well as the book DECORATE WITH QUILTS AND COLLECTIONS published in 1996 by Nancy J. Martin. Her peony quilt with sawtooth border was published in Robert Shaw's book QUILTS A LIVING TRADITION.

The Nebraska State Quilt Guild inducted Mary into the Nebraska State Quilt Guild Hall of Fame in 1987, and she has served as presenter at Quilt Nebraska several times.

Many scholars have benefited from the large library of quilt books and information relating to quilts housed in Mary's home. She has been most generous to share with university students and others seeking information on quilts.

We salute Mary Campbell Ghormley for her foresight in organizing the Lincoln Quilters Guild and her continuing loyalty to the Guild. We commend Mary for serving the quilt world at large through her weekly volunteer work at the International Quilt Study Center, and her participation in quilting organizations, seminars and meetings.

Ty's gracious and gentle manner make her easy to know and love and her vast knowledge of quilts, quilters and quart folklore is inspiring to all.

In the latter years of the century, quiltmakers created patterns with reference to birds in great numbers. Feathered Star, Jester's Plume and Wild Goose Chase are just a few of the patterns illustrating American quilter's ongoing fascination with birds.

Join Sara Dillow, bird enthusiast and textile collector, at the International Quilt Study Center's Tuesday Talk, September 17th at 3:30 pm in the University of Nebraska State Museum (Morrill Hall) auditorium. Dillow will discuss the popularity of birds through the lens of her interest in both bird-watching and textiles and quilts.

International Quilt Study Center University of Nebraska-Lincoln Inaugural Symposium 2003 Wild by Design February 27 - March 1, 2003


The focus of the inaugural symposium, sponsored by the International Quilt Study Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, is the innovative, creative and unique elements of quilts, both historic and contemporary. Participants will explore what motivates creative energies within individuals and enables them to produce compelling and unusual works of art and design. Also explored will be cultural, technical, aesthetic and sociological forces that contribute to design innovation in quiltmaking.

Invited speakers for the symposium include Miriam Schapiro and Ellen Dissanayake. Miriam Schapiro, influenced by the feminist movement, embraces the use of textiles as symbolic of feminine labor. She is credited with establishing the movement called Pattern and Decoration. This art movement challenged traditional Western European art by foregrounding decorative patterns and textiles from other cultures such as Chinese, Indian, Islamic and Mexican. Schapiro coined the term "femmage," which stands for the female laborer's hand-sewn work (such as embroidery,

quilting, etc.) that rivals and precedes the "high-art" collage. Ellen Dissanayake is an independent scholar, writer and lecturer, whose approach to the arts synthesizes many disciplines, but is underpinned by the viewpoint of evolutionary biology. She is the author of three books, What Is Art For? (1988); Homo Aestheticus: Where Art Comes From and Why (1992), and Art and Intimacy: How the Arts Began (2000), all published by the University of Washington Press. Other speakers include Michael James and Janet Berlo.


The Wild by Design symposium will bring together artists and art historians, cultural anthropologists, historians and women's studies scholars, as well as textile artists, textile historians and collectors. It will provide a unique forum for dialogue among a broad spectrum of individuals interested in quilt design, the social and cultural history of quiltmaking traditions and related textile traditions worldwide.

The Center, established in 1997, is dedicated to fostering a deeper appreciation for the importance of quiltmaking traditions by combining academic scholarship with the collection, conservation and exhibition of quilts. 6" Block (6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " unfinished)... Piece a background of dark or medium blue prints (or solids) utilizing 4 - 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares (can be 4 different or alternating 2). Overlay with star applique of gold print in the center. Background prints should be smaller or less obvious. Gold print can be larger.
