President's Report: Sheryl thanked everyone who has volunteered for committees and those who helped with the quilt show, county and state fair. Volunteers are needed for the Nominations Committee.

### **New Business:**

Sandy Anderson moved that the proposal for the LQG to enter into an agreement with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Foundation to raise \$50,000 over the next five years, with an initial donation of \$10,000 for the establishment of "The Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room" in the to be built International Quilt

Study Center building be brought to the floor for discussion and be voted on at the October meeting of LQG. Seconded by Jean Davie. Discussion included:

Cr. Pai Curse explained that the building had been approved by academic planning committee. An architect is working on preliminary plans and costs.

The building will included dedicated year round exhibition space, work areas, storage, parking.

The current IQSC space will be used to house the other UNL textile collections.

The UNL Foundation will help with mailing, bookkeeping , etc. No money will be funneled through the LQG treasury--donations go to the foundation, earmarked for the LQG fund.

There is no liability to the guild if we cannot raise enough money.

If the building is not built, money will go to "The Mary Campbell Ghormley Scholarship"

The vote in October will be by secret ballot as per LQG bylaws. The meeting adjourned at 8:50 pm. Show and tell followed.

**Proposal:** The Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room in the International Quilt Study Center-University of Nebraska, Lincoln



Mary & Roger Ghormley

The Lincoln Quilters Guild Vision Committee was established to look into the future for opportunities for the Guild to promote its vision of education in the art and craft of quilt making. To that end, a special project committee was formed to make preliminary inquiries into how the Lincoln Quilters Guild could bring two dreams together into a vital

project for the Guild.

One dream is an extension of that of Robert and Ardis James when they donated over 900 quilts and a substantial amount of funding for the formation of the International Quilt Study Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Their dream, one shared by all who have played a part in the continued development of IQSC over the past five years, is to have a separate building to house the quilt collection and to provide space for conservation work, public exhibitions, staff offices and research.

Another dream has grown from the lifelong commitment to quilt history and documentation by LQG's founding mother, Mary Campbell Ghormley. Mary's love of quilting has led her to collect an invaluable library of over 400 quilt books, many of which are vital to ongoing

quilt study and research. She has catalogued and housed this library, used it extensively for her own research, and opened her home to others doing similar research. Mary's dream, shared by her husband Roger, is that her library would continue to serve the purpose of quilt education and research when they are no longer willing to house and care for it.

3e two dreams converged into one thought. It was first expressed without intent but has grown into the project that we propose here. To have a Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room in the proposed International Quilt Study Center building that would house her library and other selected materials so they are readily accessible for both academic and public research.

On February 5th, 2002, Diane Deahl, Jo Baxter and Sandra Anderson as members of the LQG Vision Committee, met with Dr. Pat Crews, Director of IQSC and Rachelle Humiston of the University of Nebraska Foundation to discuss the feasibility of such a project. We discussed the naming of the room and the possibility of housing Mary's extensive quilting library and research materials in that room. The details of the Ghormley donation would be worked out by the Ghormleys and the Foundation. The naming of the room would be dependent upon a sizable donation from the Lincoln Quilters Guild to honor her and along with her, honoring those who joined her in forming LQG and those who have benefited from her inspiration. We envision the Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room, housing Mary's library to be used for on-site research by scholars, artists, researchers, and collector. It would also provide wonderful educational opportunities and resources for us as LQG members.

On February 19th, 2002, Diane Deahl and Sandra Anderson met with Mary and Roger Ghormley to ask for their blessing to proceed with the proposal. They graciously accepted.

farch 7th, representatives of the Vision Committee presented a proposal to the LQG Executive Board, requesting permission to explore the possibility of launching a project to raise funds to establish "The Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room" in the proposed International Quilt Study Center building. The proposal was accepted.

The following steps have occurred since that meeting:

- A special projects committee has been formed, consisting of Chairperson Sandra Anderson, Mona Jeanne Easter, Pat Hackley, Carroll Dischner, Connie Strope, Diane Deahl and Judy Lane.
- This summer (June 2002) the University gave their approval for the IQSC building to be erected on a proposed site just west of the Dairy Store on East Campus. Plans are currently underway for

the design and construction of the building. This building will be financed by private donations and no tax money will be involved.

- The special projects committee met with Dr, Crews and Rachelle Humiston to discuss the procedures for this endeavor from the financial and administrative aspects.
- Rachelle Humiston on behalf of the Foundation provided the LQG special projects committee with a draft of a proposed agreement between the Lincoln Quilters Guild and the University of Nebraska Foundation. This agreement would specify that the Lincoln Quilters Guild would donate \$50,000 over a 5-year period to name a room in honor of Mary Campbell Ghormley. The Foundation would agree to do mailings, accounting and legal work required for this project.
- The special projects committee met with Carolyn Meter, LQG Treasurer and Sheila Green, LQG Assistant Treasurer, to discuss the Guild's current financial base and projections for its future financial health. It was proposed that a contribution of \$10,000 from the Guild treasury could be used to start the process.
- On August 9th, the special projects committee invited the members of the Executive Board to meet with them at the International Quilt Study Center to visit the facility and to meet with Dr. Pat Crews and Carolyn Ducey to raise questions they had about the proposal. Those attending included Sheryl Jonas, Carolyn Meter, Sheila Green, Sandra Anderson, Pat Hackley, Carroll Dischner, Connie Strope and Diane Deahl.

On August 22, 2002, Sandra Anderson and Carroll Dischner presented the proposal to the Executive Board. Permission was granted to bring the proposal before the Guild at large at the September 9th meeting. The floor will be opened for questions and discussion. The proposal will be published in the October Plain Print and a vote will be taken by secret ballot at the October meeting. This procedure is in accord with the Guild By-Laws for money expenditures and commitments exceeding \$500.

The special projects committee has discussed various fund-raising ideas, including:

Silent Auctions Teas Quilters Carnival Mini Workshops Sewing Room Tours Celebrity Raffle Quilt Exploring the feasibility of matching funds, donations and grants ---- All suggestions are welcome!

Some will Ask: "Why name it the Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room" – if the money is being raised and donated by the Lincoln Quilter Guild? Indeed, Mary herself was the first to ask this question. The answer is simple: because Mary represents the best and brightest in the quilting world. She has given so much of herself to all of us who love quilts and quilt making, and she has done so quietly and humbly. Mary has been a living resource not only for Lincoln Guild members but also for quilters across the state and the country. Without Mary we would not be what we are or where we are today.

The national reputation of LGQ has grown on the shoulders of Mary and those who followed in her footsteps, to pursue their love of quilt making and to honor the tradition. The guild's reputation has been built on numerous trailblazing events, including hosting one of the first national quilting symposiums in 1977 here in Lincoln. Speakers drawn from outside Nebraska included Phyllis Hader, Helen Squire and Michael James. This was followed by LQG setting up and carrying through the Nebraska Quilt History project, which led to the publication of the prize-winning book, Nebraska Quilts and their Makers, edited by Dr. Pat Crews and Dr. Ron Naugle. Next came the first NQA Quilt Show in Nebraska held in Lincoln in 1991.

When you read the mission statement in the front of your yearbook, by fulfilling this project we will be fulfilling each of the purposes of our guild. By working toward this goal, Lincoln Quilters Guild will be making a vital contribution to the completion of the International Quilt Study Building. This building will bring many visitors, scholars and researchers to Lincoln and provide educational opportunities about quilting that we never dared imagine. We will be contributing to an international appreciation of quilting. At the same time, we will be increasing the opportunities that we have for coming in contact with quilt scholars, researchers, and collectors, making new educational opportunities available for us as LQG members that as a guild alone we could not accomplish.


