January Speaker

There is so much to be said of Mary Ghormley, it is difficult to condense this into a few paragraphs. Mary began quilting in 1960. She was mostly self-taught because there were no classes and not many people were quilting then. Mary, with her friends, Louise Howey, Hazel Myers and Betty Voss, organized the Lincoln Quilters Guild in 1973. Mary served as Vice President, then as president in 1974 and remains an active member today.

Mary has been featured in COUNTRY HOME, LADIES' PATCHWORK CIRCLE and KIPPLINGER'S MAGAZINE as well as the book DECORATED WITH QUILTS AND COLLECTIONS. Her peony quilt with the sawtooth borderwas published in Robert Shaw's book QUILTS A LIVING TRADITION.

In QUILTING NEBRASKA, a documentary produced by Nebraska Public TV in 1999, Mary is featured as "the Grandmother of Quilting in Nebraska". She organized and taught quilting classes in her home and went on to give many women the opportunity to learn basic quilting when there was no other resource available.

The Nebraska State Quilt Guild inducted Mary into the Nebraska State Quilt Guild Hall of Fame in 1987, and she has served as presenter at Quilt Nebraska several times

Many scholars have benefited from the large library of quilt books and information relating to quilts currently housed in Mary's home. Many more will benefit with the addition of the Mary Campbell Ghormley Reading Room being built at the International Quilt Study Center on campus at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

Mary will present a lecture titled "The History and Mystery of Quilts" to our guild on January 10th.



January Friendship Block "Ice Crystals"

A minimum of three fabrics in this block but can be somewhat scrappy. A1 half square triangles make the star, in white with blue print. A2 half square triangles are center and outer corners, various dark blues and/or blue with white print. B is background, white on white.

Cut: 4--3" sq. B, cut once on the diagonal.


4--2 1/2" sq. B

4--3" sq. A1 (star), cut once on the diagonal.

4-3" sq. A2, cut once on the diagonal.

Join half square triangles as shown. Square them to 2 ½".



Responses to LQG Class questionnaire

250 questionnaires were distributed at the 2004 November LQG meeting. Less than half or 107 questionnaires were returned.

Of those 107, 60% had NOT attended classes recently, and 40% had attended 1 or more. If there was a 'trend' in answers they were: 63% were "unable to attend on the day of the week the class was scheduled" and 52% were "unable to attend during the day".

Suggested class times were: 33% suggested Sunday; 20% Saturday; Weekdays were 46% [weekday breakdown was Monday- 25%; Tuesday- 14%; Weds- 2%; Thur- 3%; Fri- 3%] Time of day breakdown may not be completely accurate, as this tally was not compared to the day of the week requested.... Morning- 29%, afternoon – 21%, Morning/Afternoon – 26%, Evening – 18%, Afternoon/Evening – 6% There were 19% who were not interested in class topics.

29% felt the class cost was excessive and 44% thought the cost was reasonable. 'Reasonable' class cost was listed from \$15 to \$35 for half day and \$20-\$50 for full day. Half day class: 40% thought \$15-20 was reasonable while 58% thought \$25-30. Full day class: 10% thought \$20-25; 46% thought \$30-35; 36% thought \$40-45; 8% thought \$50+.

15% felt the class required the purchase of too many special supplies.
21% indicated that they needed 'more advance notice' to arrange to take a class.
Only 1 person indicated they were 'not interested' in taking classes.
How many classes should be offered each year? (Only 63 responded to this question) 1-3: 10%; 4-5: 41%; 6 or more: 49%.

Some of the comments and suggestions made on the questionnaire will be shared at the January 2005 meeting.

Upcoming IQSC symposium Collectors, Collecting, and Collections

Mark your calendars for the second biennial symposium of the International Quilt Study Center - Collectors, Collecting, and Collections, scheduled for February 24, 25, 26, 2005. The symposium will provide a forum focusing on the phenomenon of collecting, particularly the collecting of quilts.

The Guerrilla Girls will open the symposium Thursday, February 24th at 7:00pm. The Guerrilla Girls assume the names of dead women artists and appear in public wearing gorilla masks in order to focus on issues of discrimination against women in the world of art and culture. The lecture is free and open to the public.

The keynote address will be given at 11:00 Friday morning by Dr. Russell W. Belk, Eldon Tanner Professor of Business. Dr. Belk has taught at the University of Utah for the past 20 years. His areas of expertise are consumer behavior, qualitative research, and marketing. There is a charge of \$15 per person for non-registered participants for this lecture.

In addition to the keynote addresses, concurrent sessions will be held on Friday morning and afternoon and Saturday morning. Presenters from around the world will deliver papers on topics such as "Wealth, Ambition, and Decoration: Motivations for Collecting," "Institutional Collecting: Shaping Cultural Values," and "Quiltmakers as Collectors: Quilts as Collections."

On Friday afternoon there will be a special tour of the exhibition "The Collector's Eye: Amish Quilts from IQSC Collections" at the Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery. Collectors Jonathan Holstein and Henry Barber will lead the tour beginning at 4:00 pm. That evening, after a panel discussion on "Collecting Art Quilts: Issues and Perspectives," there will be a reception and viewing of contemporary quilts from the John M. Walsh III Collection in the Robert Hillestad Textiles Gallery.

All conference sessions are open to the public, but pre-registration is required.
