



Speaking Out

We all have occasions when we can visually enjoy the treasures of the past, antique quilts in acquaintances' homes or in museums. Unfortunately, some of them are in poor condition due to improper handling, storage, or display. Love alone does not guarantee the survival of these quilts.

My aunt's precious quilts, made in the thirties and never used, were stored for years in a cedar chest. As a recipient of one of those lovely quilts, I was grateful to find the tell-tale stains from the cedar chest on the back of the quilt and not on the top. When not on display, the quilt is now stored in a clean muslin bag, allowing the natural fibers to breathe.

One of Lincoln Quilters Guild's purposes stated in Article II of the By-Laws is:
-to educate, learn, preserve and pass along what information exists about quilts and patchwork of the past and present.

We can find articles in magazines and chapters in books on the care of quilts.

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The guild's Quilt Project provided information of this kind to people attending Quilt Days in the form of a Fact Sheet by the Nebraska Cooperative Extension Service. This Fact Sheet has been and still is available to guild members.

We can all be quilt conservators and educators by heeding the good advice found in these sources and passing along the information to others whenever possible.

A list of sources for acid free tissue and boxes is available at the bulletin board area at meetings and at the Resource Room.

Minutes of the February 8, 1993 LQG Meeting.

Sonja Schneider called the meeting to order, and asked the guests to stand and be welcomed.

There were no additions or corrections to the minutes of the last meeting, so they stand as printed.

The treasurer's report, given by Pat King, showed \$1,490.85 in checking, and \$24,210.79 in the money market account.

Sara Dillow presented information about the Nebraska

State Quilt Guild (NSQG).

NSQG puts out a quarterly newsletter, sponsors Quilt Nebraska, and helps hang quilts at the State Fair. The guild also sponsors quilting parties and puts on quilt shows. NSQG, in cooperation with the Nebraska State Quilt Guild, is sponsoring a project called "Quilts--A Community Heritage: Discovering and Preserving Nebraska's Public Collections". The purpose of the project is to identify quilts in the state museums and to assist the museums in preserving the quilts. The project should be underway by January, 1994.

Heddy Kohl and Doris Von Seggem announced that the guild will celebrate its birthday at the March meeting with a dress-up party. They encouraged members to dress for the occasion, perhaps wearing something one would only wear around other quilters.

Janiece Gain announced the workshop for Cabin Fever Days, held February 20th, will be Pineapple on Point taught by Sharon Rexroad Erickson. It will be held at Heritage Presbyterian Church from 9:30 to 4:00, and the cost is \$15. A potluck salad luncheon will be served. Also at Heritage Presbyterian, the guild will celebrate National Quilt Day March 20th with a lecture by Shiley Hoosier. Coffee and rolls will be served at 10:00 and the program will start at 10:30. Janiece had handouts to give to the attendees of Shelly Burge's workshop.

Donna Welte, Jean Barney, and

Joan Biasucci of the Cedar Creek Quilters are organizing the bus trip to Country Threads near Garner, Iowa and Valley Junction in West Des Moines. The trip is scheduled for April 23-25, and includes a workshop.

Connie Strope, chair of the Spring '94 quilt show, announced that there will be judged and nonjudged categories. Quilts to be judged should fit into the red, black, and white theme of the show and be no smaller than 24x24". Connie still needs volunteers to work on the show.

Kathi Kinnaman is organizing a live auction to be held at the Spring '94 quilt show. Donations should include small, miniature, wall, and crib quilts and well-crafted dolls. Eleanor Peace Bailey will be painting a doll face to be put on a doll for auction. Kathi would also appreciate a donation of a doll bed. Proceeds from the auction will benefit the resource room and the general fund.

Sue Volkmer reminded members to think about quilt entries for the State Fair. She also mentioned that the county fairs might like assistance with their quilt shows in terms of help hanging quilts and provision of prizes. The Cuddle Quilt workshop will be held in the Resource Room March 12, 13, and 14.

Kathleen McManis will collect food for the food bank at the March meeting. She outlined the great need for food donations and reminded

us that people cannot give
themselves to quilting if they are
worrying how to feed their families.

Lora Rocke clarified the rules of
the challenge quilt. The quilts must
fall in the 36" to 45" size range, but
can be any shape. Up to seven
additional fabrics may be used; they
can be reversed or dyed. The quilts
can be hand or machine pieced and
quilted. There will be a viewers'
choice for each design category. The
applique element requires that at
least one applique central to the
design be on the quilt. The star
element requires that the quilt
consist partly or wholly of star
patterns. In the half square triangle
element, only half square triangles
may be used in the central design.
For the medallion element, there
must be a medallion that is the main
focus of the design. For the two
pieced block design, the central
design must consist of two different
block designs. Rosie Westerhold
and Mary Copple had a drawing for
the February friendship
blocks. Next month's friendship
block will be a variation of the
friendship star. The pattern can be
found in the supplement that was
mailed to LQG members.

Sonja reminded us to check the
bulletin board for news and
announcements. She passed around
the Resource Room schedule for
staffing volunteers, and encouraged
people to use the room for quilt



basting, making cuddle quilts, using
the library, and accessing newsletters
from other guilds. Next month we
will vote on whether to continue
renting the Resource Room.

Janiece Gain introduced the
speaker, Sava Dillow, who spoke on
inspirations for quilt designs.

After the program we had show
and tell, and the meeting was
adjourned.



Quilt Show 1994


LADIES - grab your whizzy-whacker, drag your fabric from its secret hiding place, and get creative. Our next quilt show will be held in the spring of 1994.




